New form for three DEQ loan programs

The Michigan Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) Revolving Loan Section (RLS) now has an Intent-to-Apply (ITA) form for three loan programs. Townships must fill out this form if they're interested in applying for the <u>State Revolving Fund</u> (SRF), <u>Drinking Water Revolving Fund</u> (DWRF) and <u>Strategic Water Quality Initiatives Fund</u> (SWQIF) loan programs. Forms for each respective program **must be submitted by Dec. 31** to be considered for the following fiscal year. Following submittal, a RLS project manager will follow up with the community to set up a discussion.



General Fund revenue up, sales tax revenue weaker than expected

Michigan's General Fund revenues are \$454 million higher than expected for Fiscal Year (FY) 2018--but the news isn't as strong for sales tax revenue that funds constitutional revenue sharing. According to House Fiscal Agency (HFA) <u>data</u> released this week, income, business and other tax revenue was up \$87.7 million from what was projected in September, but sales taxes didn't perform quite as well. While collections were up 2.1 percent over last year, the Consensus Revenue Estimating Conference earlier this year had expected a 3.1 percent increase, with a projected growth of 2.6 percent for constitutional revenue sharing. However, constitutional revenue sharing funds could grow by \$20 million once online sales taxes are collected and emitted.
